



# LCSD MIGRANT EDUCATION PROGRAM UPDATE

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# A migrant student is:

Younger than the age of 22;

- Has not earned a high school diploma or an equivalent degree;
- Has moved on his/her own as a migratory worker or with/to join/to precede a parent, spouse or guardian who is a migratory worker; and
  - The move was within the preceding 36 months
  - due to economic necessity
  - from one school district to another; and
  - from one residence to another

A migratory worker is someone who has moved within the past 36 months and engaged in qualifying seasonal or temporary work in agriculture or fishing soon after the move or, under certain circumstances, unsuccessfully sought qualifying work.

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**Total # of Migrant Students: 128**

**# of Priority For Service Students: 37**

Each recipient of migrant funds **shall give priority to** migratory children who have made a qualifying move within the previous 1-year period and who are failing, or most at risk of failing, to meet the challenging State academic standards.

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# Migrant Graduation Specialist

***Dia Galvan: Provided direct support to high school students in preparation for post-secondary success. Goal is to help students navigate graduation success as well as next steps in education.***

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# Migrant Student Advocate

***Vero Ruiz: Supports successful transition of PreK-8 migrant students and families into the school systems. Meets with teachers and other school staff in support of students. Advises families regarding the educational needs of students.***

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# Migrant Paraeducator

***Anna Fernandez: Provides direct educational support to migrant students in K-5 demonstrating need. Partners with English Language and classroom teachers to determine priority students and essential programming.***

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# Migrant Recruiter/Student Advocate

***Karen Portillo-Robles: Works to identify program eligible students as families move into, or move back into, the community to work in eligible industries. Also acting as a secondary student advocate funded out of ESSERs.***

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# Records Clerk

***Carrie Austin: Maintains all required records related to identification and services related to the Migrant program.***

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# Migrant Program Successes

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## Graduation Rate

100% Migrant Graduation Rate!

7 of the 7 Migrant seniors will receive their diploma this year.

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# Family Engagement

Dramatically increased participation at the general Parent Advisory Committee meetings over the course of the year.

Excellent turnout for the final meeting that included dance performances from local families and the Baile Folklorico dancers from elementary and middle school.

Planning to formalize the Baile Folklorico group with a paid advisory in the 22-23 school year.

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# Family Support Services

Helped families to have access to critical resources over the course of the year, including housing, groceries, and work related clothing necessities.

Helped families to gain access to health and dental care for themselves and their children.

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# 9-12 Summer School

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# HS Migrant Summer School

It is a **FREE** six-week summer program that will have units with asynchronous components to it, as well as, a field trip on Fridays. The CHS Migrant Summer Program starts the week of July 8th and ends the week of August 12th, focused on exposure to science, regional surroundings, career exploration, and peer collaboration.

## **Three options:**

1. participate in the Friday guided tours only, for no course credit;
2. participate in the Friday guided tours and complete specific coursework for a Pass/Fail grade and credit;
3. participate in the Friday guided tours and complete additional coursework for a letter grade and credit.

The program is open to eligible incoming 9th through 12th grade students in the Migrant Program.
